A message from Andy

Are you like me, fed up with listening to the news, and almost fearing what is to come next. It's as though we are in a storm and I find myself reflecting on Matthew 14:22–33 where Peter walks on the water and I turn and listen to “*Oceans (Where Feet May Fail)*” as a worship song where I find myself praying those lyrics.



Our world at the moment can feel profoundly unsettled. News cycles are filled with conflict, climate anxiety, economic uncertainty, and deep divisions within societies and communities. Many people are tired, fearful, and unsure where solid ground can be found. It often feels as though we are living on shifting waters, rather than firm land.

The story of Peter walking on the water speaks powerfully into this reality. The disciples are caught in a storm, battered by waves and wind, straining just to keep going. It is into that chaos that Jesus comes to them, walking on the water, and speaks words that still matter today: “*Take courage. It is I. Do not be afraid.*” Peter’s response is bold and impulsive, as ever. He steps out of the boat, not because the storm has stopped, but because his eyes are fixed on Jesus. For a moment, trust outweighs fear.

Yet Peter sinks when he becomes overwhelmed by the wind and waves. This, too, feels deeply familiar. Many of us begin with courage, hope, and good intentions, but are quickly pulled under by anxiety, anger, or exhaustion. The good news of the story is not that Peter never falters, but that when he cries out, Jesus immediately reaches out and catches him. Faith here is not about heroic certainty, but about knowing where to turn when we begin to sink.

The song *Oceans (Where Feet May Fail)* gives voice to this same tension. Its lyrics speak of being called beyond our comfort, to places “*where feet may fail and fear surrounds.*” It acknowledges vulnerability rather than denying it. The repeated prayer, “*Spirit lead me where my trust is without borders,*” is not a request for an easier world, but for deeper trust within a difficult one.

Together, Peter’s story and this song remind us that faith does not remove us from the storms of our world. Instead, it invites us to step out in trust, to keep our eyes on Christ, and to cry out honestly when fear overwhelms us. In uncertain times, this is not naïve optimism, but a grounded hope: that even on turbulent waters, we are not abandoned, and we are held.

Eco News



You may have noticed the new compost bin Bob has constructed at the back of the Jesus Hospital in our woodland area. This is actually a leaf mould compost bin which we have filled with leaves fallen from the Copper Beech. Leaf mould compost is a dark, crumbly soil conditioner made from decomposed fallen leaves which takes 1-2 years to mature. In time this will be used around our cultivated flowers.

Even in the cold, wet winter months wildlife can be seen in the churchyard. Moles and squirrels are very much in evidence and birds are enjoying the fat balls we hang from the trees.

Tresham Benefice Fellowship

Twenty two members met in Cransley Village Hall on Thursday January 15th and they had a presentation from two representatives from North Northamptonshire Stronger Communities department. Their remit is to bring together a range of local area partners to work towards reducing health inequalities.

The various partners share data, community issues and barriers around health and well-being to identify and agree on priorities.

Rothwell has been identified as being in the top 20% of deprived households in the Country.

Life expectations for residents in Corby is ten years less than for example residents of Oundle.

In Rothwell there is strong collaboration between NNC, Rothwell Town Council and Citizens Advice and Rothwell Library are currently providing employment support for 40 people. There are also links with Rothwell Methodist Church, social inclusion teams and leisure teams and adult learning teams.

Rothwell Town Council also provide support to people who need access to the new food pantry at The Market House on Tuesday and Thursday. They also support people with mental health problems in conjunction with *Kettering Mind* and also a task group has been set up to tackle the lack of aspirations in Rothwell children and young people.

The presentation gave us a meaningful insight into the wide ranging and complex challenges of the Department.

The next meeting will be on Thursday February 19th when we will be entertained by Jess Henderson who will be talking about *Tales from the Driver's seat - A lady London bus Driver's Life*. Jess was the very first lady bus driver and she will be talking about, and I quote "*Fun and Frolics on the buses as you've never heard it before!*" So it should be a very enjoyable afternoon. Please bring your friends along. We need a good turnout as this lady will be travelling from Daventry to speak to us.

Just a reminder that your annual subs are due at the March meeting. Julie has asked for £5 notes please as they are easier to bank. The subs are the same as always. They pay for the hall, speakers, any entertainment and of course your tea, coffee and biscuits.

Colin is open to your ideas for outings and he will be drawing up a list of outings for your approval. He has widened the membership to everyone so that you don't have to be a church member to join. Will this be the year for you? Transport could be arranged.

A springtime for the soul

February can be a tough month. Christmas is long gone and meanwhile the winter drags on; the weather's miserable and the news relentlessly depressing. There's not much to celebrate it seems.



But there are some signs of things changing. In the woods, a scattering of brilliant yellow aconites hint at the sunshine that is to come and a bank of snowdrops defies the last frosts of the year. Nature is on the move.

And so too is God. As we enter the season of Lent, we tentatively begin our preparations for Easter. Ash Wednesday's ceremonies may seem sober; reflecting on our mortality and need for forgiveness ("remember you are dust and to dust you shall return; turn away from sin"), but also pointing us to the One in whom all our hopes are founded ("be faithful to Christ").

Traditionally a season of fasting, perhaps it might be better to think of Lent rather as a time to make space for God. Fast by all means but maybe it's head space we really need, so why not, for example, turn our smart phones off for a few hours so we can think and feel and 'be' ourselves in the presence of God rather than at the beck and call of others?

Perhaps that way we might truly make Lent, what Brother Roger of Taize called it: "a springtime for the soul" and arrive at Easter with a renewed clarity about God's love and care for us all.

Point to Ponder

“*From Greenland’s icy mountains from India’s coral strand.*” These are not the opening words of a policy document on colonial expansion! They are the first lines of a hymn by Bishop Reginald Heber (1783- 1826) on the mission of the Christian Church to spread the good news of God’s love to every corner of the world.

Although, we live in a different world today from that of Heber, we still need to hear the timeless message of what it means to have a loving God in our hearts and the love of neighbour in our daily lives. There is also the divine expectation “*that nation shall not lift up a sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore.*” (*Micah 4:4*)

Most religions are not confined by national boundaries. The last few months and years have brought to our TV screens the reality of the power of evil which lies behind the greed and violence threatening not only Greenland but anywhere in the world. Bishop Heber was very pro the beauty and love that brought the world into being which was reflected in many of his hymns and in his open generous nature. However, he also coined that damning verdict on evil contained in his words in the previously quoted hymn “*and only man is vile.*”

The good Bishop was well travelled in his formative years throughout Europe and eventually became Bishop of Kolkata (Calcutta). He encountered a very divided and diverse world but he was also perceptive in discovering that there is no power on earth that can threaten our existence other than that which lies within ourselves and our disobedience to God’s will.

It is easy to look for others to blame when things go wrong but we also need to admit that we can all make mistakes. Admitting our frailty can be the first step in having a change of direction in the way we live and finding our footsteps in creating a more graceful and joyful existence. What is true of individuals is also true of nations and political ideologies. Some of those who

grab the headlines today are doing us a favour in reminding us that we do not have to follow their examples to attain happiness and wellbeing.

Do we honestly think that greed will encourage generosity and bullying support for the downtrodden? Can real peace and prosperity be achieved by bombs and bullets? There needs to be a radical change in everyone's heart if we would build human life, wellbeing, and prosperity for everyone. There is nothing contrary in human nature in regarding one another as bundles of potential energy, wellbeing, and opportunities for goodness. We were not created to be vile but loving. As James Baldwin (1924-1987) the American writer reminds us "*we cannot deny the humanity of another without diminishing one's own.*" Jesus teaches us (Mark 8:37) "*what does a man profit if he gains the whole world but loses his own soul?*"




