A message from Andy

A New Year Anchored in Hope

The beginning of a new year often comes with mixed emotions. There is excitement for fresh starts, but also uncertainty about what lies ahead. The Bible does not promise that life will be easy, yet it offers something far greater: hope that is steady, meaningful, and unshakable. As we step into a new year, biblical hope invites us to trust not in our own plans, but in God's faithfulness.



Biblical hope is not wishful thinking or blind optimism. It is a confident assurance rooted in God's character. Romans 15:13 says, "*May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.*" This verse reminds us that hope comes from God Himself. No matter how uncertain the year feels, hope grows when we place our trust in Him.

A new year often encourages reflection on the past. There may be moments we regret, goals we did not reach, or hardships we wish we could erase. Yet the Bible reassures us that God is a redeemer of time and circumstances. Lamentations 3:22–23 declares that *God's mercies are new every morning.* This means the new year is not built on yesterday's failures but on today's grace. Each day is a fresh opportunity to walk forward with God.

Biblical hope also gives strength for challenges ahead. Jesus said in John 16:33, "*In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world.*" Hope does not deny struggles; it stands firm in the knowledge that God is greater than them. When fear arises, hope

reminds us that we are not alone and that God is actively working, even when we cannot see the outcome.

As we enter the new year, hope calls us to live differently. It encourages patience instead of panic, faith instead of fear, and perseverance instead of giving up. Hope shapes how we treat others, how we face setbacks, and how we dream for the future.

May this new year be marked not just by resolutions, but by renewed trust in God. With Him as our anchor, we can step forward confidently, knowing that our hope is secure - today, tomorrow, and forever.

It's not too late to make a New Year resolution.


Here are five sustainable aims for a Greener 2026. Perhaps you could choose just one of the five and think of a realistic way you could achieve it this year.

Point to Ponder

Tom Stoppard, our recently departed and much-loved playwright, once wrote *“a truth is always a compound of two half-truths, and you can never reach it, because there is always something more to say.”* That is a truism to take to heart as we begin another new year in our existence and in the universe.

Many of the journeys we take in life are familiar, but some will be new. That is why there must be space in our hearts and lives for experiences to be expanded, knowledge to be deepened, and love to be challenged as we live out our days.

We may think we may know all the answers to life’s problems, but truth has many ways to help us fulfil our humanity and our dignity. As St Paul writes *“for now we see in a mirror, dimly.”* (I Corinthians 13:13) There needs to be an honest admission in our hearts that we should approach the future with a generous magnanimity in our attitudes. As Jesus says to his disciples *“unless you become as little children you will never see the kingdom of God.”* (Matthew 18:3)

Are we going to be content with half-truths or real solutions? There is plenty of room in our thinking for ideas to take root and develop on how to improve our humanity for the betterment of all. With magnanimity we can develop the strength to refuse to be petty-minded and self-centred about the things that challenge us and our world. There are many compelling causes that cry out for our support. There is also plenty of time to have an honest candour about the mistakes made by the authorities and ask some tough questions about decisions made in our name. We owe this hope to our wonderful universe, our human integrity and as stewards of God’s creation.

As the Psalmist describes our status as seen through God’s eyes *“What are human beings that you are mindful of them, and mortals that you care for them? Yet you have made them a little lower than God and crowned them with glory and honour. You have given them dominion over the works of your*

hands; you have put all things under their feet.” (Psalm 8 :4-6) As Tom Stoppard reminds us in his definition of truth, we are all only halfway there. However, we can work out the fulness of truth in experience and in living. Wisdom is found in the way we treat one another, and knowledge will come into its own when we look at the world as God sees it.

The fulness of life will be achieved and the virtues of kindness and honesty and happiness will be ours when we care for those God has placed into the circle of our care and concern. The truth we all seek to follow, and which gives us peace, lies within ourselves. That is why we must wish one another “*a Happy New Year!*”




