A message from Andy

"When We Lose Someone We Love: Remembering with Hope"

November always reminds me of the loved ones who are no longer with us. Loss touches every one of us.



At some point in life, we all face the pain of saying goodbye to someone we love — a parent, a friend, a child, or a partner. Even when we have faith, grief can feel heavy. The empty chair, the quiet house, the missing laugh — all remind us of how deeply we loved, and how deeply we miss.

The Bible never ignores our sorrow. In fact, it meets us right in the middle of it. Psalm 34:18 says, "The Lord is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit." God doesn't stand far away from our pain; He draws near to it.

Jesus Himself knew what it was to weep. In John 11:35, the shortest verse in the Bible simply says, "*Jesus wept*."

He cried at the tomb of His friend Lazarus — not because He lacked faith, but because His heart broke for the pain of those He loved. That moment reminds us that it's okay to cry, to grieve, to miss those who are gone. Our tears are not signs of weak faith; they are signs of deep love.

Love That Never Dies

When we lose someone, it can feel as if everything good has ended. Yet the Bible gives us a beautiful promise: *love never ends* (1 Corinthians 13:8).

The love we shared with those who've gone before us doesn't vanish. It changes shape, living on in memory, in gratitude, and in the quiet ways their influence continues in our lives.

We may still talk about them, laugh about the things they said, or feel comforted by the lessons they taught us. These are ways God helps our love endure — even beyond death.

Hope Beyond the Grave

As Christians, we grieve — but not without hope. 1 Thessalonians 4:13—14 tells us, "We do not want you to be uninformed about those who sleep in death, so that you do not grieve like the rest of mankind, who have no hope. For we believe that Jesus died and rose again…"

Because Jesus rose from the dead, we have the promise that death is not the end. Our loved ones who believed in Him now rest in His presence, whole and at peace. And one day, we will see them again — not in sorrow, but in joy.

This is the heartbeat of Christian hope: that love outlasts death, and life in Christ is everlasting.

Holding On and Letting Go

Grief is not something we "*get over*." It's something we walk through — slowly, gently, with God beside us.

There will be days of tears, but there will also be moments of laughter and peace. And in time, we find that God's comfort begins to fill the space where pain once ruled.

Isaiah 41:10 reminds us:

"Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

Even when we feel lost, God holds us fast.

So as we remember those we've loved and lost, we hold on to this truth:

Death does not have the final word — Jesus does.

And His word is life, peace, and reunion.

Until that day, we remember, we give thanks, and we live with hope—trusting that the arms that hold our loved ones now are the same arms that hold us still.

Some wise words for us all

With harvest festivals tasking place across the Benefice recently, we have spent October thanking God for the food he provides for us. But in our most recent All Together service, we took time to think about what we have done with the world he has given us, and how, perhaps, we often take his creation for granted.

To help us think and reflect, we listened to some very wise words from Dr Jane Goodall, a world-renowned ethologist, conservationist, activist and Christian. Earlier this year in March, she filmed an interview with Netflix that she understood would only be released after her death. Goodall spoke directly to the camera to deliver her final, unedited public thoughts. Here they are in full:

"In the place where I am now, I look back over my life. I look back at the world I've left behind. What message do I want to leave? I want to make sure that you all understand that each and every one of you has a role to play. You may not know it, you may not find it, but your life matters, and you are here for a reason. And I just hope that reason will become apparent as you live through your life. I want you to know that, whether or not you find that role that you're supposed to play, your life does matter, and that every single day you live, you make a difference in the world. And you get to choose the difference that you make.

"I want you to understand that we are part of the natural world. And even today, when the planet is dark, there still is hope. Don't lose hope. If you lose hope, you become apathetic and do nothing. And if you want to save what is still beautiful in this world — if you want to save the planet for the future generations, your grandchildren, their grandchildren — then think about the actions you take each day. Because, multiplied a million, a billion times, even small actions will make for great change. I

want to — I just hope that you understand that this life on Planet Earth isn't the end. I believe, and now I know that there is life beyond death. That consciousness survives.

"I can't tell you, from where I am, secrets that are not mine to share. I can't tell you what you will find when you leave Planet Earth. But I want you to know that your life on Planet Earth will make some difference in the kind of life you find after you die. Above all, I want you to think about the fact that we are part — when we're on Planet Earth — we are part of Mother Nature. We depend on Mother Nature for clean air, for water, for food, for clothing, for everything. And as we destroy one ecosystem after another, as we create worse climate change, worse loss of diversity, we have to do everything in our power to make the world a better place for the children alive today, and for those that will follow. You have it in your power to make a difference. Don't give up. There is a future for you. Do your best while you're still on this beautiful Planet Earth that I look down upon from where I am now. God bless you all."

Remember, Remember

Remember, Remember... That is, of course, the beginning of the children's rhyme about the gunpowder plot of 1605.

But Remember is a very good summing up word for the month itself.

November brings us a season of remembering. All Saints followed by All Souls as we remember those who have gone before us. The Saints of old whose lives inspire us in our Christian journey and the local, maybe only known to us, souls who have walked with us in faith.

Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day call us to remember the horrors of war so that in remembering we might avoid such actions as lead to these tragedies.

November also marks the end of the Church year and as with every time of ending and beginning we remember what has been and we look to what will be. The church year ends with the Sunday before Advent when we remember what is important to us. We keep it as the feast of Christ the King remembering that it is in Jesus Christ that all things are held together, that it is Jesus who the saints follow and it is the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, laying down his life for us, that inspired those who lay down their life for peace.

That Sunday is also often known as 'Stir up Sunday' from the collect rather than from the Christmas pudding and cake stirring in the kitchen! The Book of Common prayer Collect leads us to pray "Stir up, O Lord, the wills of your faithful people; that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works, may by you be plenteously rewarded; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

So in this month of November I pray that we will remember...

Those who lived faithful Christian lives (and do so too), those who we love as see no longer (cherishing our loved ones now), those who sacrifice for peace (and commit ourselves to work for peace) and finally Jesus Christ, God who left the glory of heaven to be one of us.

In our remembering may we be inspired to action, to be stirred up, faithful Christian people known for the fruit of Good Works. Amen.

Point to Ponder

John Phillips (born 1904) was Vicar of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Lee, in London during the second world war. He used the time he had to spend in the bomb shelters to begin modern translations of the New Testament.

It seemed to him that the young people in his youth club did not understand the vocabulary and phrases of the traditional Authorized Version of the Bible. These young people inspired his efforts, and he went on to translate other parts of the Scriptures during the rest of his life. (He died in Dorset in 1982).

J B Phillips became very well known for his work as a writer and broadcaster. One of his strengths as a translator lay in the way he could give the reader digestible chunks of prose rather than snippets of verses as laid out by the old translations. This puts the words of Jesus and his actions into the context of a challenge of a meaningful dialogue with the Saviour.

One of the most dynamic and thoughtful books Phillips wrote has the title "Your God is too small." (1953) This little treatise, which is still available, encourages the reader to have a vision of our humanity as seen through God's eyes and explained by the words of Jesus. "The truth taught by Jesus" claims Phillips, "is the right way to live. It is not primarily a religion, not even the best religion, but God himself explaining to us in terms that we can readily grasp how Life is meant to be."

As Phillips himself puts it, about the early Christians and their writings "they still speak to us from across the centuries. Perhaps if we believed what they believed, we might achieve what they achieved."

There is more to religion than petty rules and regulations. The bigger issues lies in how God will lead His people in to newer and more challenges, J B Phillips believed in a God of adventures, surprises and new beginnings because that is what he uncovered in the words of Jesus that he was translating, and in the lives of His disciples as they founded the new Churches in His Name. We need to recapture something of that excitement in our faith today. Is it because we have not found a God "big" enough for our contemporary needs? We seem to have become bogged down in all sorts of constraints and expectations, hidebound to the past, that we are finding it difficult if not impossible to enjoy God's grace, freedom, and joy which were the hallmarks of the first Christians. We are losing our capacity to wonder at the beauty of the universe and our belonging to each other that we would prefer to bring it down to a pocket-sized world. We can no more do this to the universe than we can with God. We need to open our bunkers and let in His Light to our minds!


