Pew News

A message from Andy

As I write this, within our Benefice we have just celebrated the Flower Festival at Holy Trinity, enjoyed the fete at Rushton, the bridge day at Thorpe Malsor and this Saturday we look forward to 'Loddfest' in Loddington. I am always grateful for the number of people willing to give their time, effort and finances to make these events such a success. But what I am most in awe of is the imagination and creativity on display.



Whether it is the floral displays in church, the planning behind a village fete, the music, art and entertainment at a festival, or the countless practical tasks that make everything work, these occasions reveal something remarkable about us: we are creative people.

The Bible offers a deeper explanation. In Genesis 1 we meet a God who creates: speaking light into darkness, shaping the world, and calling it good. In Genesis 2 we are told that God formed humanity from the dust and breathed into us the breath of life. That means creativity is not an optional extra for a few gifted individuals; it is part of what it means to be human, made in the image of a Creator God.

Scripture also shows God's Spirit at work in human skill. In Exodus, Bezalel is filled with the Spirit of God and given wisdom, understanding and craftsmanship to build the Tabernacle. Creativity here is not just artistic expression but a form of worship - skill offered back to God for the blessing of the community.

When we walk through a flower festival, enjoy a village fete or gather for community celebrations, we glimpse this same gift. People use their

talents, time and imagination to bless others. In a world often marked by criticism, division and weariness, these moments remind us that generosity and beauty are still alive among us.

Yet there is also a gentle challenge in this. If we are created in the image of a creative God, then creativity is not meant to be confined to a few events or a few people. It is meant to shape how we live every day. The question is not only whether we admire creativity, but whether we are willing to offer our own - our time, our ideas, our energy - for the good of others.

Too easily we can become consumers of what others produce rather than participants in what God is doing. We enjoy the festival, the fete, the music and the displays, but hesitate to step forward ourselves. Yet the Spirit who breathed life into humanity still calls people to take part, to contribute, to build and to serve.

At Pentecost in Acts 2, the Holy Spirit does not create passive observers but active witnesses. Ordinary men and women are filled with courage and speech, sent out into the world. The same Spirit continues to invite us into participation rather than observation, into contribution rather than consumption.

So as we enjoy these events, we give thanks not only for what has been created, but for the Creator - and we also examine our own response. Where is God inviting us to serve, to give, to imagine, to build? What might it look like for us to move from appreciation to participation?

Every act of creativity, every moment of service, every gift offered in love points beyond itself to the God whose Spirit gives life and still breathes within us today.

Churchyard Wildlife Survey 7th June

There were a lot of bees this month feeding on the flowers in the border especially red-tailed bumble bees and a few buff-tails.

There weren't so many birds but perhaps I did the survey at a time in the afternoon when they were having a siesta! The birds I did see were jackdaw, swift, blackbird, woodpigeon and robin. I noticed two juvenile dunnocks feeding in the 'scruffy' area under the copper beech so it is perhaps useful after all.

It's great to hear from Kim's survey that birds and insects are benefiting from our efforts to make the churchyard more wildlife friendly. There have recently been comments about the untidiness under the copper beech tree, hence Kim's use of the word "scruffy." This is the area the *Wild Life Trust* suggest we leave undisturbed for a year to let nature take its course. They advise us to wait until September before asking the council to mow. Inevitably weeds appear and it doesn't match the rest of our tidy churchyard.

Whilst we agree people should be able to enjoy a tidy, peaceful place to visit the resting place of their loved ones we feel it isn't unreasonable to leave a small section of it for the birds and bees. Because of increased building and urbanisation across the country nature has less and less chance to thrive and fewer wild places exist.

We have sought further advice, removed some of the weeds near the railings and ask for your patience and understanding for the next couple of months as we try to support God's creatures.

Nevertheless, God is with us in the ordinary moments as well as in the times of crisis, he is with us in stability as well as in change. When we rest, he is the still point of the turning world, when in times of change or trial he sustains and upholds us.

As the psalmist puts it: *'If I take to the wings of the morning and settle in the farthest limits of the sea, even there your hand shall lead me and your right hand shall hold me fast.'* (Psalm 139: 9-10)

Whatever July means for you, may you find Christ's peace at the heart of it all.

Point to Ponder

The birth of our first great grand child recently was an occasion of boundless joy and reflection. There is something of the divine in a baby that evokes a sense of awe and wonder.

Each child born is unique and special and reminds parents, grandparents, and great grand parents of the journey of life on which we all travel and its challenges. When Lillie Bella was placed into my arms for the first photographs, I recall the words of the old song made popular by Max Bygraves “*when you hold a brand-new baby you need tender hands to guide them on their way.*”

It is everyone in the family circle who will love and share with the parents the joy of the new arrival. It is also important to note that a good neighbourhood, school, and environment play their part in the development of the growing child.

There are lots of folks who do not share in this integrated approach to the education, wellbeing, and development of support for our young people. It is sad to hear about underfunding in health and community services as well as school budgets not meeting the challenges of the day. I am particularly sad that voluntary youth movements struggle to find leaders thus depriving our young people of the fun and friendships that can be found in long established organisations.

We need to recover the value in service and concerns for others in our community expectations. It is all very well for politicians to have performance related goals and procedures as they prepare their budgets, but what about God’s expectations on how we care for and encourage our young people in the challenges of life?

Everyone must find their own way of making sure that our communities and neighbourhoods have the resources to give the best to our children. Our babies are not just our future hopes they are our present challenge-not just at home but in all places of conflict and poverty. Those who seek election to office and government need to have their egotism challenged by the words of Jesus Himself. When asked, who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven? He called a child, whom he put among them and said *“Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven.”* (Matthew 18 verses 1-4)

The same applies to the bullies who have a warped sense of their humanity and who find it easier to riot than to reason. They need to look at themselves through the eyes of their creator and reach the same conclusions about our humanity as does the Psalmist, *“I thank you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; marvellous are your works, my soul knows well.”* (Psalm 139 verse 13) There is nothing like a newborn infant to bring us to our senses!

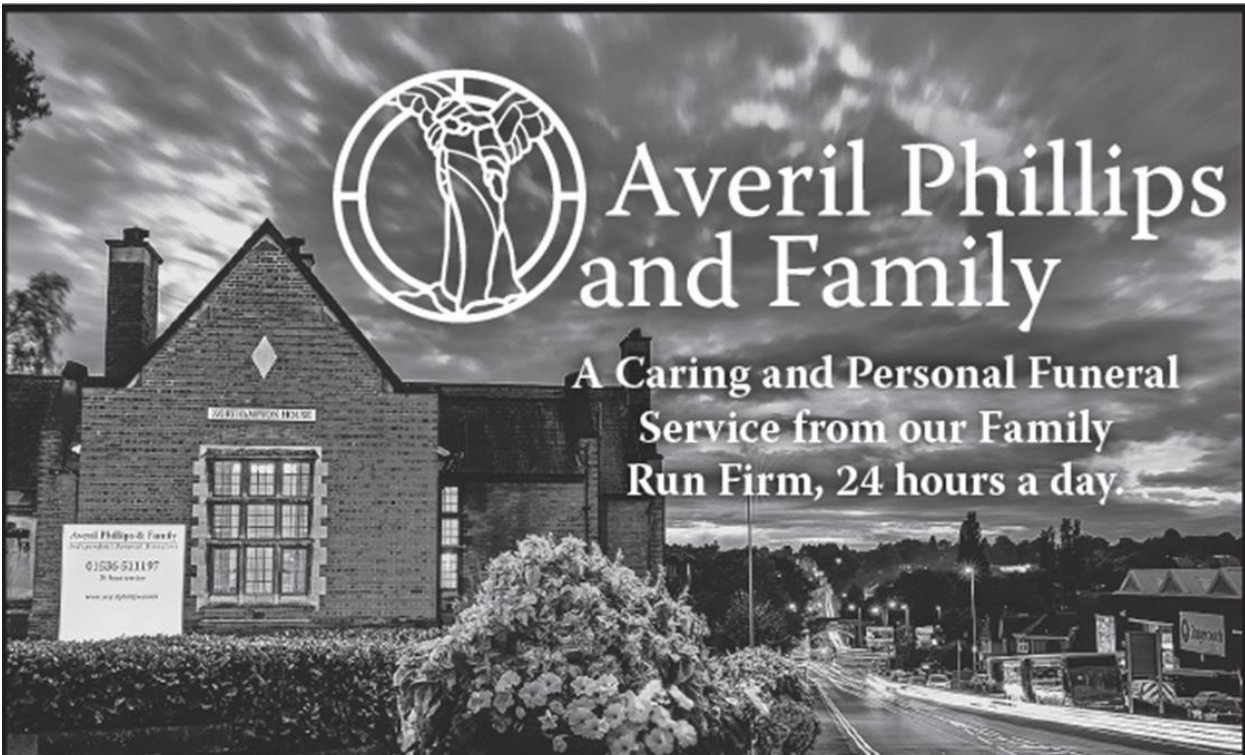
