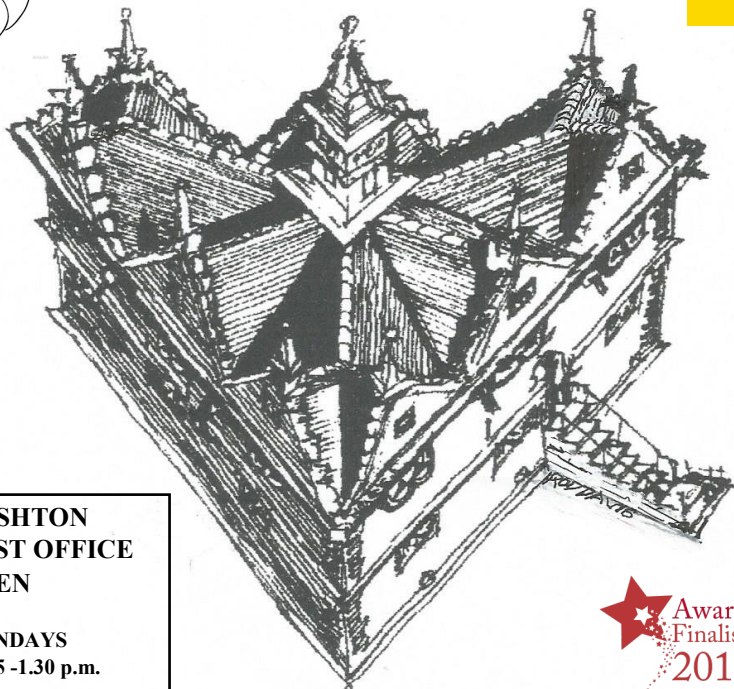

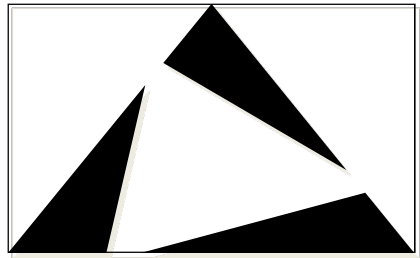

There are many good points about living alone (whether by choice or not). When lovely meals are put in front of you, you eat them and appreciate the effort made on your behalf - but cooking for one is not always fun, as Delia Smith would have us believe. It's just easier to warm up a ready meal or eat a banana. Procrastination truly is the 'thief of time' - Charles Dickens knew what he was on about! The moral of the story is that you have to find reserves of self-discipline when the delights/constraints of living with someone disappear. It takes a long time to get it right.

Problems are also published on the **FixMyStreet** website, so you can browse your local area and see what the prevalent problems are and what's been fixed.

You can also upload a photo to help show what the issue is.

Once you've sent your report, it goes straight to the council, who will get back in touch with you directly.

RUSHTON POCKET PARK

Have you ever wondered how birds and animals survive the winter? The birds are well-looked after by many residents in Rushton, but they and small mammals need to find somewhere to shelter from the cold. The trees are rapidly losing their leaves, but the thick hedges provide much needed protection from the worst of the cold and damp. The Pocket Park provides the ideal habitat because there are plenty of hiding places and the neighbouring gardens are just a short journey to get food and water. If you don't leave food out, you can still provide life-saving water for drink and for baths. Birds still bathe in winter and it is an entertaining sight to see sparrows, blackbirds and even wrens washing themselves. The water needs to be fresh and clean - daily top-ups are ideal if you have time. Water in ground containers as well as bird baths is also helpful - it's not just the birds that need a drink.

If you look closely, you can already see small signs of regeneration - hazels will be sporting new catkins soon. Nothing is dead - just resting. After a summer of plenty in 2025, everything deserves a winter siesta! Creatures burrow, birds roost together to keep warm - just like us.

Places like the Pocket Park are more needed than ever - the disappearance of many front gardens and the building of new houses and warehouses in this area is reducing the amount of space for wildlife.

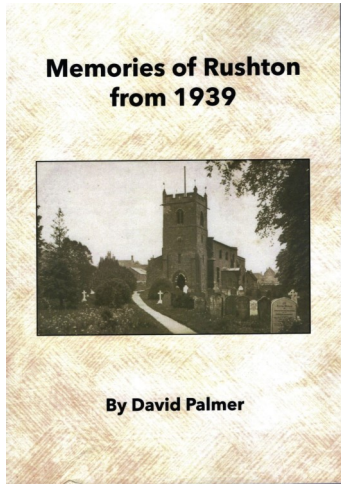

RUSHTON VILLAGE W.I.

Our speaker in October was Philip Yorke who gave a fascinating talk on Women Spies of the Civil Wars. He started with some facts about the period. Did you know that 5% of the British population died during the civil wars? That's a higher proportion than in either of the world wars.

Women were perceived at the time as 'weaker vessels'. They were expected to raise children and be silent and obedient. Despite this, around 60 women were known to have been civil war spies. We heard about three of them.

Jane Whorwood was a noblewoman who applied for an export licence to be able to move freely between London and Oxford (the Royalist capital city). She smuggled in vats of soap to the King. This was used to pay for the escape of the Queen and the royal children to France.

Elizabeth Alkins was a pauper with three children. She became a spy after her husband was executed for spying. She couldn't read or write, but had a perfect memory for facts that she heard. She sat in alehouses listening to the conversations going on around her.

Lucy Hay, the Countess of Carlisle, was a lady-in-waiting to the Queen. She was part of the Queen's spy network, spying for the French. After the King's execution she was sent to the Tower and threatened with the rack. She was said to be the greatest beauty in Europe, and was the inspiration for the character Milady deWinter in The Three Musketeers.

POINT TO PONDER FOR NOVEMBER 2025

John Phillips (born 1904) was Vicar of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Lee, in London during the second world war. He used the time he had to spend in the bomb shelters to begin modern translations of the New Testament. It seemed to him that the young people in his youth club did not understand the vocabulary and phrases of the traditional Authorized Version of the Bible. These young people inspired his efforts, and he went on to translate other parts of the Scriptures during the rest of his life. (He died in Dorset in 1982). J. B. Phillips became very well known for his work as a writer and broadcaster. One of his strengths as a translator lay in the way he could give the reader digestible chunks of prose rather than snippets of verses as laid out by the old translations. This puts the words of Jesus and his actions into the context of a challenge of a meaningful dialogue with the Saviour. One of the most dynamic and thoughtful books Phillips wrote has the title “Your God is too small.” (1953) This little treatise, which is still available, encourages the reader to have a vision of our humanity as seen through God’s eyes and explained by the words of Jesus. “The truth taught by Jesus claims Phillips, is the right way to live. It is not primarily a religion, not even the best religion, but God himself explaining to us in terms that we can readily grasp how Life is meant to be.” As Phillips himself puts it, about the early Christians and their writings “they still speak to us from across the centuries. Perhaps if we believed what they believed, we might achieve what they achieved.” There is more to religion than petty rules and regulations. The bigger issues lies in how God will lead His people in to newer and more challenges, J. B. Phillips believed in a God of adventures, surprises and new beginnings because that is what he uncovered in the words of Jesus that he was translating and in the lives of His disciples as they founded the new Churches in His Name. We need to recapture something of that excitement in our faith today. Is it because we have not found a God “big” enough for our contemporary needs? We seem to have become bogged down in all sorts of constraints and expectations, hidebound to the past, so that we are finding it difficult, if not impossible, to enjoy God’s grace, freedom, and joy which were the hallmarks of the first Christians. We are losing our capacity to wonder at the beauty of the universe and our belonging to each other that we would prefer to bring it down to a pocket-sized world. We can no more do this to the universe than we can with God. We need to open our bunkers and let in His Light to our minds!
