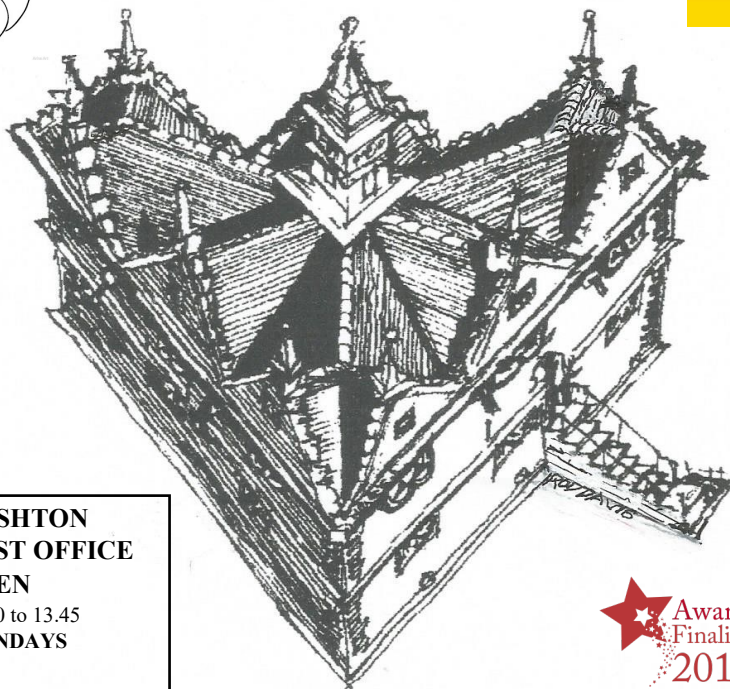

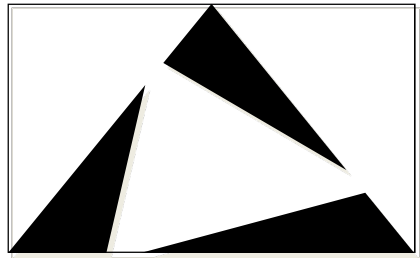

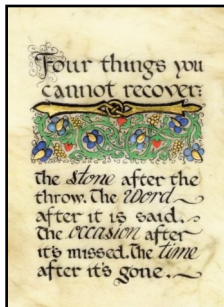

Community Engagement Update 1st July 2026

Speed Limits



Rushton Parish Council is continuing to support the introduction of a 20mph speed limit within the village.

The formal process has now begun, with the Parish Council submitting a justification document in support of the proposed 20mph limit. This document meets the criteria set out in North Northamptonshire Council's recently adopted Speed Management Policy and is available on the Rushton Parish Council website.

The proposal is based on concerns regularly raised by residents about road safety, particularly in areas with narrow roads, limited footways, restricted visibility and regular pedestrian movement. Specific concerns have also been raised about school drop-off and pick-up times, when congestion increases and vulnerable road users are most exposed.

The Council also recognises the increasing impact of commuter traffic passing through the village as surrounding housing and commercial developments continue to expand.

The aim of the proposed 20mph limit is to improve safety for residents, pedestrians, children, older people and everyone using the village's roads and shared spaces.

This is one of several initiatives the Parish Council is pursuing to make roads across the Parish safer, in line with the Road Issues Report and the petition signed by 272 parishioners.

The Parish Council will continue to keep residents informed as the process progresses and welcomes feedback and support to demonstrate the strength of local feeling and help build a safer environment for everyone in Rushton Parish.

The Mothers' Union continues to flourish all over the world, United in prayer and worship with Christian Care for Families.

Heavy Goods Vehicles



Help us improve road safety in Rushton Parish. Rushton Parish Council is continuing its work to improve road safety throughout the parish, including addressing concerns about Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) exceeding the 7.5-tonne weight restriction on parish roads.

Residents can play an important role in supporting this work. If you observe an HGV that appears to be violating the 7.5-tonne restriction, please make a note of:

- The vehicle registration number
- The name of the operating company (if displayed)
- The date, time, and location of the sighting (where possible)
- Direction of travel
- Photographs or videos (where possible)
- Any other information that could be relevant

Please do not put yourself or others at risk when gathering information. Only record details if it is safe to do so, avoid stepping into the road, and do not attempt to stop, follow, or confront drivers. Any photographs or videos should be taken from a safe location and in a way that does not distract road users or compromise anyone's privacy or safety.

Please forward this information to the Rushton Parish Clerk at **clerk@rushtonparishcouncil.gov.uk**.

The evidence provided by residents will help us build a clearer picture of the scale of the problem and strengthen our ongoing efforts to secure road safety improvements and ensure compliance with the weight restrictions.

Response to Road Safety Petition

Rushton Parish Council has received a formal response from North Northamptonshire Council's Democratic Services team regarding the road safety and highways petition submitted on behalf of parishioners.

The petition, supported by 272 residents, raised a range of concerns, including traffic volumes, speeding, school-time congestion, drainage, road condition, signage, visibility, verge maintenance and street lighting across Rushton Parish.

North Northamptonshire Council has acknowledged the strength of feeling within the parish and reviewed the petition alongside available traffic, speed and collision data. Although the response states that the current evidence does not support large-scale engineering measures at this stage, the Council has confirmed that it will continue to work with the Parish Council on practical and proportionate improvements.

Areas for continued follow-up include maintenance issues, targeted improvements such as signage or Vehicle Activated Signs where appropriate, school-related parking and congestion, drainage concerns, road surface condition, vegetation management and street lighting requests.

The Parish Council will continue to engage with North Northampton-

shire Council through parish walkabouts and liaison meetings and will keep residents updated as matters progress.

We thank all parishioners who contributed to the petition and helped bring these important local road safety concerns to the Council's attention.

POINT TO PONDER FOR JULY 2026

The birth of our first great grand child recently was an occasion of boundless joy and reflection. There is something of the divine in a baby that evokes a sense of awe and wonder. Each child born is unique and special and reminds parents, grandparents, and great grand parents of the journey of life on which we all travel and its challenges. When Lillie Bella was placed into my arms for the first photographs, I recall the words of the old song made popular by Max Bygraves “when you hold a brand-new baby you need tender hands to guide them on their way.” It is everyone in the family circle who will love and share with the parents the joy of the new arrival. It is also important to note that a good neighbourhood, school, and environment play their part in the development of the growing child. There are lots of folks who do not share in this integrated approach to the education, wellbeing, and development of support for our young people. It is sad to hear about underfunding in health and community services, as well as school budgets not meeting the challenges of the day. I am particularly sad that voluntary youth movements struggle to find leaders thus depriving our young people of the fun and friendships that can be found in long established organisations. We need to recover the value in service and concerns for others in our community expectations. It is all very well for politicians to have performance related goals and procedures as they prepare their budgets, but what about God’s expectations on how we care for and encourage our young people in the challenges of life? Everyone must find their own way of making sure that our communities and neighbourhoods have the resources to give the best to our children. Our babies are not just our future hopes; they are our present challenge-not just at home but in all places of conflict and poverty. Those who seek election to office and government need to have their egotism challenged by the words of Jesus Himself. “When asked, who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven? He called a child, whom he put among them and said “Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.
