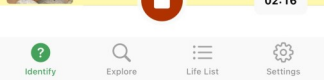
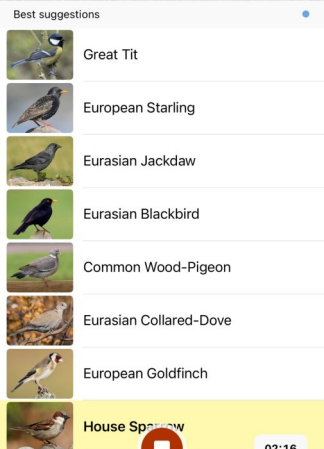
RUSHTON POCKET PARK

The Pocket park is an extremely good place to use the MERLIN app for birdsong identification. It's free and easy to use on your 'phone. I find it very useful to spot birds that I may no longer be able to hear, such as house martins and swallows. The picture is an example of what the screen looks

like. It's an American app, produced by Cornell University, so ignore the words Eurasian and European when you see them. The screen goes yellow when the bird is actually singing, but you have a record of everything heard. This was a cool evening in March 2026.

If you look in the hedge bottoms at the moment, you will see Green Alkanet flowering profusely. This plant is a classic example of 'lovely plant, but not in my garden, thank you very much.' Unfortunately, the plant cannot recognize boundaries, and sows itself wherever it feels like it. So, in the Pocket Park, it's

brilliant, but in gardens, it's a plant in the wrong place, i.e. a weed!

The salary will be based upon experience and qualifications, but within the benchmark salary scale LC 1, SCP 7 – 12.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Responses from April

A pleasing number of responses to Kevin's 'From the Archives', about the village shop and Post Office. Thank you.

From Brenda (Downing):

"My parents, George and Lily March moved to Rushton with their two daughters, myself and Beryl Wetherall, to our new home, 4, Council Houses, now called 7, Manor Road. Four of these new houses built after the Second World War, were allocated to agricultural workers. Having lived in Kettering all her life, Mum's first visit to the Village Shop was for potatoes. Mrs. Vise told her that Rushton people did not need potatoes as they grew their own on their allotments. Hence no potatoes.

Before Lilah, a lady called Mary Sinclair from Scotland, moved in to assist Mrs. Vise. Mary got involved in at least one concert to raise money for the purchase of the Methodist Chapel, to be used as a Village Hall. Mary got enough volunteers to perform in a play. I remember her coming to our house and asking my Mum to PLEASE get my father to learn his lines, but I'm afraid it was a losing battle. At least the audience seemed to enjoy it."

From Diane (Hefford):

"My abiding memory of Lilah was with the dogs, all four of them. If her house door was open, and she wasn't there, three of them would stay by the door and look at you while Paddy would walk out and around to you - he would let you stroke him. The other story was when a man tried to rob her. She opened her door and the dogs came out, with Paddy coming into the shop and the man was walking out. Well, that's what I heard, and a policeman came knocking on my door asking if I'd seen anything. I don't remember the year."

And from Jackie:

"In 1979, we were completely snowed in. A lady, known as Pixie, who lived at number 12 Midland Cottages, went to the shop to get two things - cat food and firelighters. Lilah sold her the cat food, because she didn't want the cat to go hungry, but she refused to sell Pixie the firelighters, because she wasn't a regular customer! I remember the German shepherd called Shannon, who used to sit in the doorway. He was friendly, but it was an intimidating sight because he was huge. Lilah was kind to many people, but she was selective in her hospitality!"

Rushton Roxy Cinema Delights with The Choral

Rushton Village Hall was alive with energy on Saturday 18th April as the Rushton Roxy Cinema welcomed an excellent turnout for its latest community film night. The Choral drew one of our strongest audiences to date, with residents and visitors gathering to enjoy an evening of shared entertainment.

From the moment people began arriving conversations flowed easily, newcomers were warmly welcomed, and the hall filled with that unmistakable buzz that tells you a community event has truly hit the mark.

The film itself proved a thoughtful and uplifting choice. Set in 1916 during the First World War, *The Choral* follows a Yorkshire town's choral society as it recruits a diverse group of townspeople to perform Elgar's *The Dream of Gerontius*. The story weaves together themes of music, identity, loss, and resilience, with standout performances from Ralph Fiennes, Roger Allam, Mark Addy and others.

Critics have praised the film for its emotional depth, unsentimental story-telling, and the way it uses music to bind together a community under strain. The Guardian described it as "a quiet and consistent pleasure... deeply felt" with a blend of wit, poignancy, and humanity.

Events like this continue to show how valuable the Village Hall is as a place to bringing people together. A heartfelt thank you to everyone who attended, helped set up, or supported the evening in any way. Your enthusiasm keeps the Rushton Roxy Cinema thriving.

We would also like to extend our sincere thanks to the Rushton Community Minibus and its volunteer drivers for their invaluable transportation support.

POINT TO PONDER FOR MAY 2026

Once again, we find ourselves living in a fragmented world with war and conflict between the nations, and at home, discontent and distrust. As someone once put it “life is like a zoo in a jungle.” One of the ways out of the entanglement is to heed the moral challenge found in Aesop’s fable, “The Four Oxen and the Lion.” (He was a sixth century BC Greek writer). “A lion used to prowl about a field in which four oxen dwelt. Many a time he tried to attack them; but whenever he came near, they turned their tails to warn one another, so that whichever way he approached them he was met by the horns of one of them. At last, however, they fell a-quarrelling among themselves, and each went off to pasture alone in separate corners of the field. Then the Lion attacked them one by one and soon made an end of all four.” The moral of the tale is “united we stand, divided we fall.” This familiar axiom is also found in other stories and songs down through the ages. Yet its common sense is frequently disregarded. How many times in a dispute have we heard in the argument the words “I can do without you!” (Eliza Doolittle’s retort to Professor Higgins in *My Fair Lady* can easily become the order of the day!) Yet it is cooperation not individualism which brings about reconciliation, growth, and well-being into a good life, a prosperous business, or a fair-minded nation. J.K. Rowling mentions this point of view in her novel *Harry Potter and The Goblet of Fire* when she makes Albus Dumbledore say “we are only as strong as we are united, as weak as we are divided.” Over sixty years ago, Barbra Streisand, the American singer won over our hearts and strengthened our common humanity with her song “people, people who need people are the luckiest people in the world. We are children, needing other children and yet letting our grown-up pride hide all the need inside, acting more like children than children.” Political petulance at the highest level diminishes a nation’s soul and stunts a country’s pride. Many of the treaties between the nations were achieved by costly sacrifices. War is not a sign of strength in the world but weakness. Nations need one another to end the more important battles against famine, disease, and deprivation. We need one another in our communities, whatever our backgrounds, to enjoy and enrich one another and our livelihoods. It would be more constructive to heed the words of St Peter, “be vigilant. Because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walks about seeking whom he may devour: whom resist, steadfast in the faith” (1Peter 5:8,9) The lions are not just found in forests, jungles, and zoos but in the desert of the human heart. We need to help one another to live with this reality and meet its challenges.
